Let Freedom Ring

Right now, I am working on a quilt that recognizes all of the men and their wives of my family who fought in wars for our freedom. Starting with Resolved White in King Philip's War to my husband Ed, who was called to the Berlin Wall crisis.

I wanted to create something to honor the history of family for my descendants so they would know our personal participation and it would remain for as long as the quilt survives.

I created Americana shields and under each war in which ANY ancestor fought and included the women who stood by and stood up for their husbands during these frightening times—who would win, will my husband survive, are my children safe?

So, I began this quilt in memory of all our Revolutionary War Patriots (Ed's Crosby side and my Mom and

Dad's side). I wanted it to be VERY personal so I decided on representing each Patriot as a silhouette. I found little males of Colonial times in three stages, young, middleaged, and then old. Then I found one of a beautiful colonial female and stopped looking. I giggled a

lot when I thought of these wives as being *forever* young, thin, and beautiful!!

To honor all of the women of our past, I create every quilt by hand—not one sewing machine stitch! However, I do use electric lighting over the traditional candle!!

Just imagine all of the years of searching to find all the names, their birth and death years and places, the wives names (most including maiden names), and the dates and places of their marriage, and their military records. A LOT of 'midnight oil' was used, believe me!

Again, honoring tradition, I used a silky white fabric for the middle-aged couples because I wanted to show that they might have been able to afford better quality material, while the young bucks (16-29 with a young wife and children), got a white on white cotton material!

The center of the block is an Eagle holding a banner that tells the reason for this quilt: to honor all of our ancestors who stood up in the face of death for our freedoms. The Betsy Ross flag is individual stripes of red and white with 13 stars. I beaded the symbols of America so the stars are white crystal montees.

The Eagles are also glorified. I beaded all the white feathers in white sequins with clear

crystal beads.

At my age, with glaucoma, tired fingers, and weary bones, I wondered IF I could ever finish this memorial quilt in their honor, but then I would think of the sacrifices that they all made, and continued on, thinking "if they could do it, so can I!"

The blocks around the silhouettes I named Star Spangled Star. It blends a Blazing Star pattern and an Ohio Star pattern into one new block. This meant setting 30 POINTS to create this block. In the center of each block and the gold metallic star, I added another crystal montee, and used stones of red, white, or blue. The black material used in this star block is a marbleized black with mottled puffs of green, red, grey, or blue that I chose as it then represented the rockets' red glare, the bombs bursting in air over that dark night.

The swags used in the final border use also the same black and white toile pattern that I used in the



Stars block. The gold stars between each swag are of the same gold metallic fabric. The centers of these stars carry the shield of each of the 13 colonies and from which these Patriots fought.

Not finished yet, I realized that our country did not begin on July 4th 1776, but the seeds were planted two hundred years earlier with the uncertainty of our Mayflower Pilgrims. So, then MORE study to find every single ancestor who stood tall in the face of annihilation and then I created Americana shields, and included a name banner with the name of the conflict and the name of each ancestor in that conflict, that included all of the Wars in which our ancestors participated. Thus, from Resolved White in King Phillip's War to the Cold War in which my husband stood in face of the Soviet Union at the Berlin Wall.

The Eagles again fly above these Americans with the help of little "blue birds of happiness", holding a gold ribbon above all of these Americans who understood that Freedom was worth saving and in the face of death.

I am quilting it now using silk thread of red, white, blue, gold, and silver. Very difficult, but each stitch I take is the LEAST that I

can do in their memory.

Let Freedom Ring!

Hello Cousin Mike,

So, while quilting this morning I remembered this back story about the how the shields came about in the quilt. Several years ago, I assisted Victoria Withers (a TPPWS member) to research her line for both the GSMD and the PWWS, We found her line to the Plantagenet Kings and thus Charlemagne. We became good friends/relatives and in discussing the quilt with her one day, and talking about how to incorporate all of the ancestors who fought to preserve their lives and freedom, Victoria mentioned creating little Americana shields and then adding the conflict and their names under that shield that came before the Revolutionary War and those who come after that momentous victory. To add more history, I used little patches to add even more history—one, a ship denoting the Mayflower and under the name of Ebenezer Rice, the direct descendant of William > Resolved. There are gold and black crowns that identify the descendants of a Plantagenet ancestor on both Ed's and my lineages; a Minuteman, denoting those Patriots who were there on Lexington Green and the shot heard round the world. Will almost have to write a

manual on how to 'read' the messages left on this quilt!

And just a word about genealogy: As so many of the Mayflower passengers had descendants who were the children/grandchildren of the Puritan immigrants, finding their ancestors in the UK could bring more history of our historic American ancestors. Since most people in England/UK today cannot find their OWN ancestors beyond 1860 (per Dr. John Plant, London England), when OUR ancestors arrived in the early 1600's (1608, Jamestown, 1620 Mayflower, 1633-1645 Puritans to MA, Thomas West (Lord de la Ware) bringing 400 people to VA in 1610, and Cecelis Calvert (Lord Baltimore) arriving about 1634 to land donated by the Monarchy that became Maryland, they brought the names of their parents, grandparents and family history with them, so we had the benefit of their personal family members' names and history that dated back to the late 1400's. There is a saying that, "If you know their names, they are not forgotten."

There is a statistic that is very enlightening for a GOOD reason to continue working to 'find their names: "If you had AN ancestor in ANY colony by 1720, you Will BE related to 75% of all other people who had an ancestor in any colony by 1720". So, as you get back deeper in time, that probability only increases that MIGHT provide a

name of an ancestor that has deep roots in England and Europe.

Please remember his family in prayer.


